

- **10 Shop Watch Update** Rachel reported that Shop Watch was a bit quieter at the moment.


AOB: - community gardens, 4 stop searches have taken place in here, Ruth will cut back the shrubbery when informed where the problem areas are that are overgrown.



AGENDA ITEM REPORT TITLE	13.1 Town Centre Safety		
Background	With a reasonably steady daytime and the growth in the evening economy, significant concerns are being raised about the safety of pedestrians and cyclists on Bridge Street in the Town Centre due to the abuse and lack of enforcement on vehicle movements in that area. 1. The signage clearly states that vehicle access is allowed after 4.00 pm through to 10.00 am for deliveries. During that time the road access barriers at the top of Bridge Street / Market Street and Bridge Street/ Swan Bank are removed at 4.00 pm and re-instated at 10.00 am. However, cars and vans are gaining access via Little Street and West Street, between those hours when it should only be used by pedestrians and cyclists 2. 

Background	Founded in 2006, the Partnership originated from the Congleton Market Town Initiative, evolving significantly since its first constitution in January 2007. The Partnership continues to respond to the needs of the community and support VCFSE (Voluntary, Community, Faith and Social Enterprise) sector, leveraging I resources to enhance Congleton.				
	<u>Updates:</u>				
Details	The first community event 'Meet the Funders Event' was held on Tuesday 19 th Nov '24. It was a successful event with over 80 attendees. There was a soft relaunch of the Partnership with organisations applying to be affiliate members. New members include:				
	Congleton Rugby Union Club, Congleton Street Pastors, Congleton Pride, Congleton Rotary Club, New Life Church, Wild Spirit Woods, SWANS, Artisanity, So Cheshire, CHOC Care Community, Cheshire East Integrated Care Partnership.				
	We need to continue the membership drive with more community events (detailed below) and refresh the Partnership website.				
	Christmas Tea Dance was held on the 4th of December. Andrew Bell provided the entertainment. We invited local care homes and canvased bungalows in West Heath, Mossley and Buglawton. A successful event, we had fantastic feedback from the attendees and raised over £100 for the Mayors charities. We would aim to hold a similar event each year.				
	Christmas Hampers - £1000 grant from Plus Dane and £300 Partnership funds allowed us to create 130 Christmas Hampers for people receiving Old Saw Mill meals.				
	<u>Events 2025</u> –				
	Discover Volunteering – 11 th March Congleton Town Hall 6 pm – 8 pm with Congleton Volunteer Action, spotlight on volunteering organisations within the town. Introducing CVA and celebrating our volunteers 'Congleton Crew'. In a similar style to the Meet the Funders event, we will be introducing members of the public to volunteering opportunities within the town.				

	Health and Wellbeing Fayre - 18th March 2025, Congleton Town Hall. With over 30 exhibitors participating, the event is a comprehensive showcase of the diverse health and wellbeing services available within the Congleton community. Whether it's fitness, mental health support, community activities, or specialised services, the Fayre promises a wide array of resources. VE Day Celebrations – 8 th May – A shared moment of celebration. In partnership with CTC, plans are being made to celebrate the 80 th celebration of VE Day. Following suggestions from https://www.veday80.org.uk/ we are holding a fish & chip dinner / 1940's inspired lunch, we will be inviting local care homes and isolated residents.
	Green Fayre – 27 th September
	The 6 th annual Green Fayre is a chance to explore green issues and local solutions. Around 30 stallholders take part on the day, a good mixture of local businesses, groups and organisations. As the Green Fayre coincides with the Markers Market it is always a busy day. The Makers Market is on the Bridge Street area and the Green Fayre is on the closed High Street and Town Hall.
	Other Projects:
	Community Transport – The Partnership continues to operate community transport with New Life Church. Successful application to Flourish fund, awarded £8200 for driver training to increase our pool of volunteer drivers for Partnership buses (D1 category is a license requirement to drive 17-seater.) Currently in talks to arrange the training.
	Margaret Williamson Memorial Fund – The Partnership administers the MWMF, applications will be open for applications in late February.
	Creative Champions/Congleton Volunteer Action - Alison Wright is continuing her work to promote, encourage and celebrate volunteering within Congleton. Starting with the volunteer event detailed above we will be running sessions throughout the year.
